'Forgotten' Remarks That Became Indelible

here's always a story behind a story. As a kid, I was fascinated by the tale that President Lincoln dashed off the Gettysburg Address, one of the greatest speeches in American history, on the train ride to Pennsylvania. That story has been debunked.

However, I've since learned another story behind the story:

Spectators said he looked pale, even "ghastly," as he delivered the speech. On the train home, he felt sick, and indeed his doctor later gave him a diagnosis of smallpox. Even when weak and dizzy, his wordsmanship did not fail him. "For once in my life," he said, "I found something I can give to everyone." It took him more than three weeks to recover from a serious form of the disease that was sometimes fatal.

Another interesting note — the President's twominute address was not the keynote speech of the event to dedicate part of the battlefield as a cemetery. Perhaps that's why it was so short; it was meant to be "remarks."

At a recent national conference in Washington, D.C., I was one of many PBSTV station execs who heeded filmmaker Ken Burns' countrywide call to learn the Gettysburg Address. Each of us taped a video for posting on the website, **learntheaddress.org**. Several of us became a little choked up. Even though we already knew the words, their meaning hit us hard as we spoke.

I urge you to check out the website to see our current President and other former Presidents, movie stars, Maui's gift to pro baseball, Shane Victorino, and other prominent figures and citizens deliver the address. You're invited to post your own taped speech to the website.

Recording the indelible words that President Lincoln thought would be forgotten made me think of other past-century presidential "remarks," and how some thoughts remain as fresh as ever. "...we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain..."

- Abraham Lincoln, from the Gettysburg Address

Here are just a few vintage presidential quotes that have spoken to us across the years:

- George Washington: "When one side only of a story is heard and often repeated, the human mind becomes impressed with it insensibly."
- Benjamin Harrison: "I pity the man who wants a coat so cheap that the man or woman who produces the cloth will starve in the process."
- Calvin Coolidge: "I favor the policy of economy, not because I wish to save money, but because I wish to save people. The men and women of this country who toil are the ones who bear the cost of the Government."
- Franklin Delano Roosevelt: "...the only thing we have to fear is fear itself nameless, unreasoning, unjustified terror which paralyzes needed efforts to convert retreat into advance."
- Harry S. Truman: "The external threat to liberty should not drive us into suppressing liberty at home. Those who want the Government to regulate matters of the mind and spirit are like men who are so afraid of being murdered that they commit suicide to avoid assassination."

Acts of Courage

Students "learn by doing" with the Gettysburg Address. **The Address** premieres Tuesday, April 15 at 9:00 pm.

he world will little note, nor long remember what we say here..." Ironically, these words come from one of history's most famous speeches—The Gettysburg Address. Delivered four months after the battle near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, where more than 10,000 Americans lost their lives, President Abraham Lincoln's speech gave renewed hope and meaning to the country during the darkest days of the Civil War.

A Nationwide Effort

Last year, this two-minute rhetorical masterpiece about freedom, devotion and sacrifice celebrated its 150th anniversary. In honor of the event, documentarian Ken Burns produced **The Address**,

a 90-minute film that tells the story of a Vermont school, where each year students are encouraged to memorize, practice and recite the Gettysburg Address.

Reciting the Gettysburg Address is a central study feature at Greenwood School, a Vermont boarding school

for boys with learning disabilities. Burns filmed students on campus for three months as they prepared for the competition.

Burns said he increasingly saw a correlation between the boys' struggle with the speech and Lincoln's call for "a new birth of freedom."

"It is a minefield for these kids," Burns said. Getting to the point where they can recite the address in public involves "acts of courage that are embedded in this speech."

Greenwood headmaster Stewart Miller said that reciting the Gettysburg Address has been a core of the school's curriculum for all of its 35 years.

"It's not a long speech, but it has a lot of complexity," Miller said. "It is about finding the inner strength to push through. What we talk about is grit — setting a goal and sticking to it. And, when you memorize something, you really own it; it becomes a part of you."

According to Burns, Lincoln's words "tell us what it means to be American. They call us to unfinished work, not just to win a war, but to build a more perfect nation."



In Hawaii, we have similar examples of "learning by doing" educational experiences:

• History Day, a program of the Hawaii Council for the Humanities, is a year-long history education program where students across the state create hands-on research projects that are entered into local and state competitions, culminating in a national competition. "History Day enables students to get a deeper understanding of historical events that still responds today" goordinator Jane Murae said.

that still resonate today," coordinator Jane Murao said.



- In the Hawaii Shakespeare Competition, students statewide memorize and recite Shakespearian monologues and sonnets of their choosing, while developing close reading and public speaking skills. "Performing Shakespeare empowers and transforms the performer," said coordinator Mark Lawhorn. "It's the best way to learn Shakespeare."
- Most closely aligned with the Greenwood School is the "Lincoln Day Program" at Ewa Elementary School. The program is held each year on Lincoln's birthday, before a statue of Abraham Lincoln that was willed to the school by Katherine McIntosh Burke, a teacher and principal at Ewa School from 1919 to 1927.

Principal Stan Tamashiro remembers attending Lincoln Day programs as a student.

"Since U.S. history is the focus of the social studies curriculum in fifth grade, we feel it is a natural fit for the fifth graders to recite the Gettysburg Address," Tamashiro said. "The act of memorization and reciting brings the words alive." The Address encores April 19 at 7:00 pm.

Kalihi: A True Mixing Pot

hen I think of Kalihi, I think of a very limited area that was my world when I attended Damien Memorial High School on Houghtailing Street. During those four years, the farthest I remember exploring was to the Kamehameha "Kam" Shopping Center to get a burger from Kenny's Drive-In.



Now, decades later, with construction on PBS Hawaii's NEW HOME about to commence at Sand Island Access Road and Nimitz Highway, I wondered what more there was to learn about Kalihi.

Warren Nishimoto, Ph.D., and Michi Kodama-Nishimoto at the University of Hawai'i Manoa Center for Oral History, pointed me to interviews they had conducted with people who lived, played and worked in Kalihi. I also tapped into the rich resource of interviews from **Long Story Short with Leslie Wilcox**.

SHE WIICOX.

As it turns out, there was much to learn.

Antonio Evangelista, who lived on Republican Street, remembers the rice fields that occupied the space where Kuhio Park Terrace now stands. There were taro patches on what is now School Street, pig farms deep in the valley and cow pastures near the *ewa* end of King Street. Four fishponds thrived where Sand Island now lies.

The culture of Kalihi was a true mixing pot, with Filipinos, Chinese, Hawaiians, Portuguese and Japanese all living close to one another. The late Senator Hiram Fong was born in Kalihi. Former Governors John A. Burns and George Ariyoshi, along with former Honolulu Mayor Mufi Hannemann, all grew up in the district.

Former Governor Ben Cayetano looks upon his days growing up in Kalihi with fondness: "I lived on Silva Street – Silva and Mokauea Street. It was a good place to grow up, actually, because everyone knew each other. We didn't lock our doors. You felt safe."

Arthur Akinaka, a civil engineer, remembers Houston Arena, a boxing arena built in the cane fields makai of King Street. Kalihi also had its own Barefoot Football League team, known as the Kalihi Thundering Herd.

But alongside the comfort of diverse cultures, Kalihi had its dark side. In the mid-1800s, the Kalihi Hospital and Detention Station treated people afflicted with milder cases of Hansen's Disease, or leprosy. In 1942, after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Japanese Americans were interned on Sand Island. The barracks also served as a way station for internees who were shipped off to internment camps on the mainland.

Today, Kalihi is still an active, vibrant community. Between the rain-drenched valley and the bright beach at Sand Island, Kalihi is home to cozy plantation style homes and small businesses, co-existing with larger industries. Many people who work in this area also call it home.

In 2016, PBS Hawaii will become a part of Kalihi, an area that has given us so many stories. At Sand Island Access Road and Nimitz Highway, we will continue our mission of bringing the world to Hawaii and Hawaii to the world – including more stories about Kalihi.

"Kalihi was the world. I climbed the mango tree in my backyard, and I would sit up there and eat the mangoes all day."



"If Hawaii changes too much when I leave, I'll feel like it's my fault," Kainoa Horcajo of Maui remembered thinking to himself before he moved to Oregon. Kainoa also lived on Oahu before moving back home to Maui.

Kainoa added: "I just want to mention that I'm saying 'the Continent,' instead of 'the Mainland' because for me, Hawaii is my main land."

Our Community Advisory Board meetings are loose forums to help us keep a pulse on what is happening in Hawaii's communities. These forums are mandated by PBS and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.


