A Local Decision Bridging Thousands of Miles

n most American cities, public television and public radio are the only locally owned major media organizations.

At PBS Hawaii, decisions are made right here about how best to serve our local viewers and listeners.

When the Japanese tsunami hit last March 11th, we exercised PBS Hawaii's ability to move quickly to fill a need for timely, reliable information. Our programmer, John Kovacich, coordinated with *NHK World*, the English-speaking global news arm of Japan's public broadcaster, to bring Hawaii viewers a full day of the developments satellite-fresh from Japan. He learned that our top *NHK World* colleagues were safe and sound in Japan, waiting for the trains to start running again. Without hesitation they gave the go-ahead for us to use their satellite coverage at no cost.

"Our thoughts and prayers remain with the people of Japan, as they continue to hold loved ones in their hearts and to re-build."

As you know, daytime here usually is reserved for children programming. But *keiki* also have a safe harbor elsewhere, on our PBS Kids channel. PBS Hawaii Master Control staffer Vicky de Mercer ran a "crawl" every ten minutes, reminding parents of young children

that they could turn to PBS Kids on our "free" over-the-air channel, 11.2, or on Oceanic cable channel 443.

It was a furlough day. Many children were at home, and we wondered if we'd hear a howl of outrage. Why the heck were we showing disaster footage instead of *Sesame Street* and *Arthur*? The calls never came.

Instead, at the end of the day, we heard from people who'd watched intently for hours.

"Couldn't believe it!" emailed a viewer. "I'd been watching other channels for those little snippets of tsunami video credited to *NHK World*, and then I turned to you guys—and wow! You had wall-to-wall *NHK World*.

Hours of tsunami pictures and the latest information and no commercials. Thank you!"

A woman called to express her gratitude. At first she had trouble finding the words, but when she found them, they were profound.

"My family is from Honshu," she said." I am powerless to help them. But somehow, in some small but important way, I'm experiencing what they're going through and my spirit is with them."

Our thoughts and prayers remain with the people of Japan, as they continue to hold loved ones in their hearts and to re-build.

The daylong tsunami coverage was an example of what a locally owned, noncommercial public media organization like PBS Hawaii can do.

PBS Hawaii is the first public broadcaster in the country to offer satellite-live, Englishlanguage reports from *NHK World* via a satellite dish on our roof. We'd like to thank these donors for principally underwriting the cost of the dish — the Atsuhiko and Ina Goodwin Tateuchi Foundation and the law firm Cronin Fried Sekiya Kekina and Fairbanks.

On April 11, Hiki Nō presents another first!

Students at Ke Kula Niihau O Kekaha Learning Center on Kauai will be the home base school for a half-hour of news stories produced by students from across the state. The Kauai students, who hail from Niihau and study at the charter school in Kekaha, will host the show, speaking in the Hawaiian language, specifically Niihau dialect. English subtitles will be provided for viewers.

The students in grades 8 to 10 are enrolled in the school's Media Program. Under the guidance of their media teacher Jim Lucas, the students wrote their script in English, then translated it into the Niihau dialect. Teachers at the school who speak the dialect reviewed the scripts for accuracy.

In May, you'll see a news story on Hiki Nō produced by Ke Kula Niihau O Kekaha students, which reflects life with ties to both Niihau and Kauai.

3-PART SERIES RETURNS SUNDAY, APRIL 10, 17, & 24 | 8PM

It's 1936 and, sweeping away the cobwebs from the most famous address in MASTERPIECE history, a new couple moves into 165 Eaton Place. Thus resumes the romantic, moving and epic story of *Upstairs Downstairs*, more than three decades after its last episode on PBS.

Lavishly produced, beautifully acted and eagerly awaited by millions of fans, *Upstairs Downstairs* is one of the jewels in the crown of MASTERPIECE's 40th season. It airs in three one-hour episodes on MASTERPIECE Classic, Sundays, April 10, 17 and 24, 2011 at 8 pm.

"I'm so happy that we can offer our MASTERPIECE viewers this 40th anniversary gift of *Upstairs Downstairs*," says executive producer Rebecca Eaton. "This 2011 version is charming, romantic, touching and fresh. I think it will entrance a whole new audience."

The stellar cast includes the original series creators Dame Eileen Atkins (Cranford, Murder on the *Orient Express*) and Jean Marsh (*Sense and Sensibility, Willow*), with Marsh reprising her Emmy Award-winning role as Rose Buck, now promoted from parlormaid to housekeeper, and Atkins appearing as the aristocratic Lady Maud. With a script by acclaimed screenwriter Heidi Thomas (*Cranford*), the sequel also stars Keeley Hawes (*Wives and Daughters*), Ed Stoppard (*Brideshead Revisited*), Anne Reid (*Bleak House*), Claire Foy (*Little Dorrit*), Adrian Scarborough (*Cranford*), Art Malik (*The Jewel in the Crown*) and Ellie Kendrick (*The Diary of Anne Frank*).

The story opens in 1936, six years after the Bellamy family moved out of 165 Eaton Place at the end of the original series. Recently inherited by young Sir Hallam Holland (Stoppard), the house has been long vacant and its considerable needs are taken in hand by Hallam's vivacious wife, Agnes (Hawes). Her first order of business is to hire servants, for which she retains Rose (Marsh), the proprietor of a domestic employment agency, although Agnes is unaware of Rose's previous association with 165. After lining up a butler (Scarborough), a cook (Reid), a housemaid (Kendrick) and other staff, Rose realizes she may be of no further use to the new family.

And so it continues, just as it did thirty-odd years ago, with stories of the upper-class and working-class intertwining in complex and interesting ways against a backdrop of world events—in this case, the abdication crisis of Edward VIII, the growing belligerence of Hitler and Mussolini on the continent and the rise of the British Union of Fascists under Sir Oswald Mosley. Amid the triumphs, disasters, joys, and tears, it's just like old times at 165 Eaton Place.

In an engaging 2-part interview with Leslie Wilcox, Tom Moffatt, Hawaii's most prolific event promoter, recalls presenting the 1966 Rolling Stones concert in Honolulu:

"Great, they were great...This was the last date on their U.S. tour...

We put 'em up at the Kahala, and they were happy and ... easy to work with. Unfortunately, they had in their rider where you had to hire 50 uniformed policemen (because) kids would mob the stage. Well, here, our young people respected authority, at least around the stage. They made noise, but they sat in their seats. And the Stones weren't used to this. And... they did a 27-minute show, because they didn't know what to do between songs. Where normally, it would be two or three minutes of pandemonium with kids rushing the stage. It didn't happen here...Can you imagine a 27-minute concert now, with a major act? (chuckle) But we didn't get one complaint."


